Evolvement Prompts Involvement

On November 29, 1964, English was introduced into the cellebration of Mass throughout the country. Along with this change, the congregation was encouraged to use familiar songs of praise and glory in the Mass. This was one of the first big changes made in the modernization of the Church by Pope Paul VI, but only part of the Mass was allowed to be in English at that time. On November 22, 1967, a proclamation stating that the whole Mass was to be offered in English went into effect. The vernacular is used so that the people may participate more fully in the Mass and understand what the priest does when he breaks the bread and says "This is My Body", and when he holds up the cup of wine and says "This is the Chalice of My Blood of the new and eternal covenant; the mystery of faith which shall be shed for you and for many unto the forgiveness of sins".

Generally, the public has accepted these changes calmly. But always, there are those who feel changes such as these are destroying the Catholic Church. This is a very natural reaction, but it has become an obstacle to further renewal in the Church and clarifying the changes already made. These people must be shown that the Church is still the same; it is simply using new words and actions to do its teaching, and in some cases, reverting to those used by the early Christians. High school and college students especially should accept these changes willingly and participate in carrying them out in order to further the progress being made in the unification of the world under one Shepherd.

Why are we there? This is one of the many questions Americans are asking each other every day about the controversial Vietnam issue. Although many of us put forth our opinions, most Americans know little about the country or its people. A short investigation of Vietnam should therefore precede any inquiry into the war.

previously been French Indo-China. After Vietnamese Communists defeated the French, Vietnam was divided into two parts: North and South. South Vietnam is an independent country with its capital and chief port at Saigon; North Vietnam is communistic, with its capital at Hanoi and its center of commerce at Haiphong.

Why are we in Vietnam? For one thing, America is recognized as a source of political stability. Also, the United States has taken on a grave responsibility to Asia. Military commitments were entered into with Asia after World War II by four presidents: Truman, Eisenhower, Kennedy, and Johnson. Mutual-defense treaties with South Korea, Japan, Nationalist China, the Philippines, Australia, and New Zeland gave America's promise to defend these countries from attacks by Red China. Many countries have made pledges through SEATO -Southeast Asia Treaty Organization. This treaty binds the United States to the defense of Thailand, and has offered its protection to South Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia. South Vietnam had taken the United States up on this offer, and this is one reason we are involved.

However, the main thing that the South Vietnamese and their allies are fighting for is FREEDOM — the precious gift that has been a prime factor in so many wars. The desire for this treasure began the French Revolution, and because the prize was so valuable, the American Revolution was fought. The Three Bears Say Hi (Ho Hum)






